Stories from our diverse community

In the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, Nairm Marr Djambana seized the opportunity presented by the COVID Recovery funding to keep our community engaged and empowered. Our vision was simple yet profound: to honor the wisdom of our older community members and elders by inviting them to share their stories, preserving their legacies for generations to come.

Twelve community members eagerly joined our initiative, each carrying within them a wealth of experiences and insights. With the support of Sina Summers from Impact Stories, we embarked on a journey of deep listening, uncovering narratives rich in culture, resilience, and wisdom.

In 2023, the culmination of our efforts manifested in the form of individual audio recordings. However, our journey took an unexpected turn when a publishing agent recognized the significance of our stories and introduced them to Magabala Books.

Magabala Books embraced our project with enthusiasm, recognizing its inherent value and deeming it worthy of publication as a collection. Thus, our stories transcended the confines of our community, resonating with readers across Australia and beyond.

Yet, the true measure of success lies not only in the book's accolades but in the empowerment of our storytellers. Every book sold means a commission that go directly to them, ensuring that their contributions are not only celebrated but economically recognized. For Nairm Marr Djambana, this endeavor goes beyond mere publication; it exemplifies our commitment to fostering a self-determining community where every voice is honoured and uplifted.

As our book graces readers' shelves and garners acclaim, it stands as a testament to the resilience, wisdom, and unity of our diverse community. Each page embodies a legacy of strength and storytelling, a legacy that will endure for generations to come.

Telling: Stories of Resilience

Edited by Sina Summers Nairm Marr Djambana Aboriginal Corporation

The 12 short life stories in Telling are grounded in First Nations storytelling traditions and reveal the diverse and complex nature of the experience of living in the wake of colonialisation. Telling fits with this year's NAIDOC theme, For Our Elders. It also speaks to the contemporary political movement for truth-telling and Treaty in Victoria and nationally. The voices of First Nations Elders living in Victoria are prioritised and honoured in this work.

These stories are from all over Australia. Each Elder reflects on intergenerational trauma, Stolen Generations, reconnection and resistance, demonstrating their deeply felt Black pride and joy and celebrating their stories of survival.

Aunty Yvonne Luke recounts her epic journey of reconnecting to Alyawerre country after several generations of removal. Koori leader Uncle Mik Edwards describs his brave story of survival after being removed forcibly from his family in 1967, and Marion Hansen tells of her surprise at being crowned Miss NAIDOC in 1969.

The evocative photographs provided by the authors bring an intimacy to this vital historical testimony that will be enjoyed by Indigenous and non-Indigenous readers alike.
